Tips to answer common/extended questions

This is all about practice, some ideas are:

- Create your own maths based scenarios and calculate the answers.
- Use an open book process and structure sheets (on TEAMS) to answer exam questions.
- Create a mind map / thought shower / brain splat for a specific 9 or 12 mark question and refer to it when answering the question.
- Create your own 6, 9, 12 mark questions and answer them
- Answer a question with a buddy, bounce ideas off each other, jointly create the perfect answer.
- Mark a partner's answer, they mark yours.
