

We finished off the final week of the half-term by zooming out one last time: from the continents to the world as a whole. Our key focus this week has been reinforcing the messages of love and inclusivity which we have been communicating throughout the term.

Our Biblical focus has been on John, encouraging our students to not only love the world itself but to seek to love one another and demonstrate acts of love and unity that have longer-lasting impacts on the world.

It has been a great term exploring different cities, countries, and cultures and how we can have a mindset that embraces diversity throughout. We look forward to exploring a new series of topics after the half-term break!

#### **Black History Month**

Continuing this year's topic for **Black History Month of Saluting** our Sisters, this week's article focuses on the life and legacy of Harriet Tubman. Harriet was a born in Maryland, USA in 1822 and was the daughter of enslaved African Americans. Harriet herself lived on a plantation growing up and endured horrific treatment from the plantation owners. At 27, Harriet escaped via the Underground Railroad, which was a network of activists and safe houses that helped slaves gain freedom.

Once Harriet was free, she became a conductor of the underground railroad, helping over 70 enslaved people escape across 13 missions. Later on, during the Civil War in America, Harriet led

a raid on plantations in South Carolina which led to over 700 more slaves gaining freedom.

Harriet moved to New York later in her life and continued to be an advocate for civil rights and women's rights.

#### **Harvest Donations**

Over this half term we have been thinking about Harvest. Last week we had an assembly from City Mission about how they distribute Harvest donations they receive and after half term some of our students will be involved in sorting donations given to City Mission over this Harvest period. Harvest provides us with an opportunity to give our thanks to God for all that he provides and to share what we have with those in our community that are in need at this time.

This year we will be working with a local food bank, running out of Oasis Church in Hangleton. If you would like to make a contribution, you can make a donation by sending in items of food and hygiene essentials. The food bank is always in need of items such as cereal, pasta, rice, pasta sauces, and tins of any kind (tinned meat, tinned fish, tinned veg etc), as well as sanitary products, shampoo, conditioner, soap and shower gel. We now have a permanent collection basket in our reception area. Donations are always welcome.

An alternative way to contribute is via '2324 Harvest Festival' on ParentPay. We will be using some of this money for our food poverty provision that we have been running since February. This supports our students who are unable to have breakfast. We would like to offer this for many years to come and by donating you are ensuring the continuation of this project. Any monies left over will be used to provide food to the local food bank.



#### **Year 8 Rugby**

Our Year 8 rugby team played their first county cup match of the season against Shoreham Academy this Monday. The boys made a good start with lots of good tackles and strong defence. However, the pressure told and eventually Shoreham made their way through our defensive line a couple of times to take the lead.

King's started to gain more possession and a good passing move down the right saw Arthur break through a couple of tackles and score a try. Shoreham ended the first half strongly and we finished at half time 4-1 down.

After half time King's made a brilliant start and were able to win more rucks and keep possession, meaning Arthur and Matanois had the op-

portunity to score some tries to bring the scores closer together.

Ultimately, the size and power of Shoreham told in the end and as we started to tire towards the end of the second half as Shoreham broke through our defensive line several times to finish the game 8-4 tries to Shoreham.

Some of the team are relatively new to rugby and it was great to see their confidence and understanding grow in the game, as well as some excellent tackling, rucking and offloads by our more experienced players. Overall, a really good start to the season and areas to work on to grow throughout the coming months.



#### **Year 9 Girls Football Tournament**

5 teams made it out for the Y9 tournament at Patcham, this Thursday. The teams were King's, Dorothy Stringer, Varndean and 2 teams from Patcham. During the matches King's demonstrated some great teamwork, passing, defending and communication. All teams at the event were strong and there were a fair few Patcham students as spectators, who were very vocal and intimidating at times.

In the first game we met Varndean, with some really good team work, Gabby R managed to convert a great chance and King's won the game 1-0. Next was Patcham B, some more great teamwork and pressing attacking play saw another goal from Gabby and a goal from Nia J, taking the win 2-0.

Our third game was against Stringer, who were very strong, despite a hard fought effort, a couple of minor mistakes gave Stringer the chances they required to take the win 2-0.

Finally we needed to play Patcham A, we needed a win from this to stay in with a chance of taking the tournament. Despite a great performance and securing the win it was not enough to take the overall tournament win.

Final standings were Stringer with the win, then King's, the 2 Patcham teams took third place, and then Varndean.

This tournament concludes this set of 7-a-side games and all 4 King's teams played very well and supported each other in many ways throughout - I couldn't be prouder of all the girls that played, but special mention has to go to Erin H in Year 7 who played in goal for every game in all 4 of the age categories. Thank you so much Erin, you have demonstrated such a mature attitude, you have lead by example and are proving to be a great role model for all around you. You perfectly exemplify the King's ethos.

#### **Year 7 Girls Football Cup Match V Hove Park**

In the torrential rain on Wednesday afternoon, the King's Year 7 girls football team took on Hove Park in their first proper game of the season. Ideally a lower stakes game would have been a better start to the season for this newly formed team, but a knockout cup game was the hand we were dealt.

As I mentioned the weather was not ideal, especially for a goalkeeper or a substitute – it wasn't ideal for spectators either, a massive thank you to the parents and pupils who came to support and assist.

Back to the game... Hove Park pressed the attack throughout the game, they were pretty relentless in midfield and attack. In saying that, we defended well and limited their chances on goal. However, Hove Park managed to get a well worked but ultimately lucky goal in the first half, with the game at

1-0 the players went into the second half with a positive attitude.

The rain continued in the second half and really took its toll on the players, although they kept battling for the equaliser, they were simply unable to get the break they needed, despite a couple of really good chances. Hove Park took their opportunities and scored another two goals. Therefore the final result was a 3-0 loss.

The Year 7's may be out of the cup, but they are yet to begin the league campaign and I look forward to seeing the team develop, under Alice C's leadership, over the year and hopefully find their winning form very soon.

#### **Year 8 Girls Football Tournament**

The latest of the tournaments, hosted at Patcham High School were for the Year 8 girls. After the disappointment in the cup game they were definitely fired up for this tournament. Unfortunately due to other cup fixtures being played, there were limited teams at the event, King's, Dorothy Stringer and 2 teams from Patcham.

The whole team, from the 8x Year 8s to the 2x Year 7s that represented King's played their heart out, and were disappointed that there were a limited number of matches.

First for King's were Stringer, with had Anna, Gabby and Etta all finding their scoring prowess to win the game 3-0. Next were Patcham 1's with both teams demonstrating some outstanding goal keeping, courageous attacking play and real winner's mentality – this game finished 3-3, 2 goals from Gabby and 1 from Etta.

Finally, King's took on the other Patcham side, no less talented than the 1's, again it was a hard-fought game, however goals from Anna, and Gabby took the win 3-1.

Therefore, King's were tied in first place with Patcham 1's, personally I was hoping for a final game to be played in order to separate the two top teams, but the decision went to goal difference, giving Patcham the win by a single goal.
