

## Sport Fixtures—Year 7 and year 9

#### **Year 9 Girls Rugby**

Year 9 took part in the first round of the Sussex Rugby Cup. In their first game they beat Uckfield College 55-20, with Iris, Maisie, Erin, Thea and Amelie scoring the tries. King's then played Downlands who had several strong runners. King's stood up to challenge and put in a solid defensive effort, with the standard set by Maisie who was relentless in bringing down a Downlands player who came anywhere near her! King's then put some attacking moves together and dominated the game 40-5. Lots of the team were playing their first every game of rugby so it was great to see their improvement during the two games and grow in their understanding of the game. A special mention to club players Amelie, Maisie, Thea and Iris who were outstanding in both games and helped coach their teammates and give them a positive rugby experience.

#### **Year 9 Boys Rugby**

On Monday, the year 9 boys lost 28-21 to Cardinal Newman who scored a try to win the game with the last play of the game. King's started well and some good defensive play set up a counterattack with Arthur running from his own half to score. Newman then got some momentum in the game and scored 3 first half tries to lead 21-7 at half time. King's changed the momentum in the second half and put some phases of play together, with Arthur scoring a second try, and Huw scoring the try of the game with a lovely show and go leaving the Newman defence tackling shadows. However, despite a much-improved defensive set towards the end of the game, the pressure told and Newman took the victory with the last play of the game.

On Wednesday, King's played a triangular match against Patcham and Varndean. King's dominated an inexperienced Varndean side and scored 10 tries in 20 minutes of rugby, with Matanios and Jude getting some of the tries. Patcham provided a stronger challenge but the quality of the King's attacking play, with good offloads and finding 2v1 on the outside, meant King's scored 5 tries to 0.

#### **Year 7 Boys Rugby**

The year 7 boys team played in a development tournament last week against other local schools. For most of the boys it was their first rugby tournament so the focus was on their skill and tactical development. In their first game King's lost to Blatch by a couple of tries, with good direct running from Guy and Isaac, as well as some good team tackling on some bigger Blatch runners. King's then drew with Newman in their next game, with more support runners allowing for more offloads, leading to some nice team tries. King's played Lewes Priory in their last game and dominated, scoring 5 tries without conceding. Overall, a great first tournament for the team showing how much they have progressed this term.

#### Year 8 Netball

Our fantastic Year 8 netball squad had a huge win against Varndean on Wednesday afternoon. The girls won 24-2, with some outstanding play from every student. After taking a very early lead, we were able to mix up some positions and try some new combinations. Ella G was given 'player of the match' by Varndean, and was also voted as 'players player' by her King's team mates. Well done to Emma, Erin, Libby, Amy, Millie, Amber, Nathania, Ella (captain) and Eleanor.







## **Year 10 Explore Hampton Court Palace**

Year 10 Explore Hampton Court Palace with a Focus on Elizabethan England

On a crisp autumn day, Year 10 students ventured to the historic Hampton Court Palace, where they immersed themselves in the world of Elizabethan England. The trip offered a perfect blend of discovery, debate, and insight into one of the most fascinating periods of British history.

The day began with a teacher-led tour of the palace's gardens and grounds. Students were captivated by the breathtaking landscapes, from the geometric formal gardens to the lush greenery of the Privy Garden. The tour highlighted how these gardens served not only as places of beauty but also as symbols of power and prestige during the Tudor period.

The group then moved indoors for a bespoke teaching session on Elizabeth I's reign, led by the brilliant and everenthusiastic Toby, whose energy and expertise made history truly come alive. Students examined the symbolism in Elizabeth's famous portraits, delving into how she carefully crafted her image as the "Virgin Queen" and a powerful monarch. They also explored the dramatic tale of Elizabeth's near-fatal bout with smallpox, which left the royal succession hanging precariously in the balance.

The session culminated in the Privy Council Chamber, where students took on the roles of Elizabeth's advisors in a lively debate about the future of the crown. Split into two camps, they argued passionately over whether Mary, Queen of Scots, or Catherine Grey should be named as Elizabeth's heir. The intensity of the debate was palpable, with students showcasing both their historical knowledge and their flair for persuasion.

Reflecting on the day, one student commented: "The debate was my favourite part. It felt like we were really part of history, trying to solve the same problems Elizabeth's council faced."

Toby's engaging teaching style proved to be a highlight, with many students praising his ability to make complex historical events accessible and exciting. "Mr. Toby was amazing—he made us laugh and think at the same time," said another student.

The trip not only deepened students' understanding of Elizabethan politics and culture but also gave them a fresh perspective on the challenges of monarchy and governance. A huge thank you to Toby, the History Department, and the staff at Hampton Court Palace for a truly memorable day.

This experience will undoubtedly inspire Year 10 as they continue their studies of the Tudor period!

#### FOOD SOS CAMPAIGN ENCOURAGES FOOD DONATIONS AND SUPPORT IN THE LEAD UP TO CHRISTMAS

The Brighton & Hove Food Partnership has revealed that more than 6,300 people rely on food banks, social supermarkets, and community meal providers each week. This includes working adults, 1,400 children, and nearly 660 pensioners.

This snapshot from the recent Emergency Food Network (EFN) report only reflects figures from school holidays, meaning even more children could be in need during term time.

The FOOD SOS campaign was launched in response to the cost of living crisis in 2022. Its purpose is to encourage those who can afford it to donate to their local food bank while also offering useful links to local support for those experiencing food insecurity. Unfortunately, the situation has not improved, and the recent EFN report cites a drop-in donations from supermarket bins and larger surplus food donations coordinated by organisations like <u>Fareshare</u>.

A perfect storm has been brewing for quite some time, with the number of people in need of food support starting to outweigh the available food donations. Currently, many food banks are dipping into their own funds to make up the shortfall, but this cannot continue indefinitely.

Join us in supporting our community as part of the city-wide #FoodSOS campaign to increase donations to local food banks and projects.
