IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR ALL CAST, CREW AND BAND of OLIVER

Saturday 8th February 2025 Rehearsal

On Saturday 8th February we have a crucial all-day rehearsal onsite from 10am-4pm. Please send your child in with a water bottle and a packed lunch plus snacks (no nuts or sesame, please) as they will NOT be allowed off site during the course of the day. Students will be expected to remain in the canteen or courtyard during free-time; this is to ensure they are supervised. Monday 10th February 2025

We will be running an all day, in school rehearsal on Monday 10th February from 8.30am to 5pm. **This is a slight change to the previous end time.** Please make sure they have sufficient food as this will be a long day. They do not have to wear uniform in school that day, but must be dressed in appropriate attire (no overly revealing or short clothing, no offensive slogans/images). Students arriving in inappropriate clothing will be sent home to change.

Tuesday 11th February 2025

We will be running a second all day, in school rehearsal on Tuesday 11th February from 8.30am to 3pm. Students do not have to wear uniform in school that day, but must be dressed in appropriate attire (no overly revealing or short clothing, no offensive slogans/images). Students arriving in inappropriate clothing will be sent home to change.

Performance Days - Tuesday 11th, Wednesday 12th, Thursday 13th February 2025

Students should be in normal school uniform on these days for the school day. On the days of the performances I would request that you make arrangements for your child to be offsite from 3:00pm until the arrival time of 5.30pm. We would ask that you try to find some way they can be accommodated at this time, perhaps with a friend who lives near the school if getting home and back is an issue. This is to allow staff a break after their teaching days. I anticipate the performances will be over by 9.45pm and your child will be free to go but must sign out with a member of staff before leaving.

Late start mornings

On Wednesday 12th, Thursday 13th and Friday 14th February students will be allowed to come in a little later should this be helpful. Students can either arrive for an 8.30am start, as per the normal school day, or arrive on site at 8:55am, ready to join lessons in school uniform at 9:00am.

LGBT+ History Month

LGBT+ History Month takes place nationally in February every year. It was founded 20 years ago, when Section 28 was repealed, by an education charity called 'Schools Out', to help increase the visibility of LGBT+ history and to support schools to provide environments in which every LGBT+ person can feel safe and seen and flourish. At King's we think it's important to mark LGBT+ history Month every year, to ensure that students are educated on LGBT+ history and to ensure that this continues to be a school in which all students, of whatever sexual orientation, are welcomed, respected, loved, and can flourish. Mrs Price led assemblies this week for LGBT+ History Month for Years 7, 8, 11 and the Sixth Form. Assemblies for Years 9 and 10 will follow next week. The assembly covered the background to LGBT+ History Month and Section 28. It also looked at the theme for the month this year, which is 'Activism and Social Change' and highlighted several LGBT+ activists including the founder of the National Trust, Octavia Hill. The assembly also looked briefly at the current position of rights for LGBT+ people across the world, and the number of countries in which it is still illegal to be homosexual. Mrs Price spoke to students about Bishop Mariann Budde's call for mercy and compassion during the National Prayer Service for the inauguration of President Trump as an example of peaceful and powerful Christian activism. Students will be reflecting on LGBT+ History Month in a tutor session next week and in a further tutor session after half term as the month of February continues. LGBT -History Month

All students in Years 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13 now have access to this website.

Unifrog is designed to support learners in making informed decisions about their futures, and it has a range of tools that are suitable for all year groups. Each student has their own account, where they can explore career options, plan next steps, and find information on everything from building skills to writing a CV. Students have access to a wide range of video and written content, and interactive quizzes and tests, including:

Students access the platform by clicking a link in their welcome email in their school account. They can then create a password and begin using the platform. They sign in to Unifrog using their email address and password, and they can do this from any computer, tablet, or smartphone. We encourage you to use the platform with your child, so you can support them through the process of deciding their next step.
